Section 102.2 (Cth) Criminal Code

102.2 Directing the activities of a terrorist organisation

(1) intentionally direct activities of a terrorist organisation knowing it is a terrorist organisation.

Maximum Penalty: 25 years.

(2) intentionally direct activities of a terrorist organisation reckless as to whether it is a terrorist organisation.

Maximum Penalty: 15 years.
