

## Murder

### Offences Committed Prior to 2003 – Delayed Sentencing

**Maximum Penalty:** Life (s.19A (NSW) Crimes Act)

The following cases involve offences committed before 2003 (introduction of SNPP) where sentencing has been significantly delayed. Since other murder sentence tables are grouped according to the year a sentence is imposed this table assists in identifying old offences for the purpose of comparative sentencing.

The cases are ordered according to the time of the offence.

**Note:** the effect of statutory provisions relating to the application of sentencing patterns and practices

Under s.21B(1) (NSW) Crimes (Sentencing Procedure) Act a court must sentence an offender in accordance with the sentencing patterns and practices at the time of sentencing unless the offender can establish exceptional circumstances.

The relevant standard non-parole period is that which applied at the time of the offence: s.21B(5)

These provisions apply to proceedings that commenced at or after the commencement of the amendments on 18.10.2022
